



GENERAL ORDERS

FRANCE, November 12, 1918.

The enemy has capitulated. It is fitting that I address myself in thanks directly to the officers and soldiers of the American Expeditionary Forces who by their heroic efforts have made possible this glorious result. Our armies, hurriedly raised and hastily trained, met a veteran enemy, and by courage, discipline and skill always defeated him. Without complaint you have endured incessant toil, privation and danger. You have seen many of your comrades make the supreme sacrifice that freedom may live. I thank you for the patience and courage with which you have endured. I congratulate you upon the splendid fruits of victory which your heroism and the blood of our gallant dead are now presenting to our nation. Your deeds will live forever on the most glorious pages of American history.

WORLD WAR I VICTORY MEDAL







- 1. **Description**: The medal is Bronze and 1 3/8 inches in diameter. On the obverse is a winged Victory, standing full length and full face. On the reverse is the inscription "THE GREAT WAR FOR CIVILIZATION" and the United States shield with the letters "U.S." surmounted by a fasces, and on either side the names of the allied and associated nations. The lapel button is a five-pointed star 5/8-inch in diameter on a wreath with the letters "U.S." in the center.
- 2. **Ribbon**: The medal is suspended by a ring from a silk ribbon 1 3/8 inches in width, representing two rainbows placed in juxtaposition and having the red in the middle.
- 3. **Criteria**: a. The World War I Victory Medal was awarded for honorable service for active duty at any time between 6 April 1917 and 11 November 1918. It was also awarded for service between 12 November 1918 and 5 August 1919, with the American Expeditionary Forces in European Russia, and was awarded to the American Expeditionary Forces in Siberia between 23 November 1918 and 1 April 1920.
- b. Battle clasps were awarded for each of the major operations for individuals actually present under competent orders. The clasps, with a star on each side of the name of the campaign or one of the defensive sectors, were worn on the suspension ribbon for the following campaigns:
 - Cambrai: 20 May 4 Dec 1917
 - Somme Defensive: 21 Mar 6 Apr 1918
 - Lys: 9 Apr 27 Apr 1918
 - Aisne: 27 May 5 Jun 1918
 - Montdidier-Noyon: 9 Jun 13 Jun 1918
 - Champagne-Marne: 18 Jul 6 Aug 1918
 - Aisne-Marne: 18 Jul 6 Aug 1918
 - Somme Offensive: 8 Aug 11 Nov 1918
 - Oise-Aisne: 18 Aug 11 Nov 1918
 - Ypres-Lys: 19 Aug 11 Nov 1918
 - St. Mihiel: 12-16 Sep 1918
 - Meuse-Argonne: 26 Sep 11 Nov 1918
 - Vittorio-Veneto: 24 Oct 4 Nov 1918
 - c. Clasps were awarded to personnel who served overseas in one of the following areas and were not entitled to a battle clasp:
 - England: 6 Apr 1917 11 Nov 1918
 - France: 6 Apr 1917 11 Nov 1918
 - Italy: 6 Apr 1917 11 Nov 1918
 - Siberia: Any service in Siberia
 - Russia: Any service in European Russia
 - d. The lapel button is bronze, except that personnel who were wounded in action were awarded a silver lapel button.
- 4. Components: The following components are authorized:
 - a. Medal (regular and miniature sizes): MIL-DTL-3943/236
 - b. Ribbon: MIL-DTL-11589/148.
 - c. Lapel Button: MIL-DTL-11484/47
- d. Streamers. Streamers are displayed on the organizational flag to represent campaign participation. The inscription on the organizational streamer will be as indicated in the unit's lineage and honors.
- **5. Background**: a. The medal was established by an Act of Congress, 1919, and promulgated by War Department General Orders 48, 1919, which was rescinded by War Department General Orders 83, 30 Jun 1919.
- b. The 14 Allied Nations decided on a single ribbon, but pendant design was left up to each Nation. Mr. James E. Fraser was the designer of the U.S. Victory Medal.
- c. The Victory Medal ribbon pattern is used in thirteen streamers displayed on the Army flag to represent World War I service. The inscriptions for the streamers displayed on the Army flag are listed in AR 840-10.

j. World War I. There were 13 campaigns for World War I during the period 1917-1918. The streamer is the World War I Victory Medal ribbon which had a red center with a rainbow on each side of the center stripe and a purple edge. The double rainbow symbolizes the dawn of a new era and the calm which follows the storm. The following inscriptions in white are authorized:

311th Regiment Lineage

Constituted 5 August 1917 in the National Army as the 311th Infantry and assigned to the 78th Division

Organized 15 September 1917 at Camp Dix, New Jersey

Demobilized 30 May - 5 June 1919 at Camp Dix, New Jersey

Reconstituted 24 June 1921 in the Organized Reserves as the 311th Infantry and assigned to the 78th Division (later redesignated as the 78th Infantry Division)

Organized in November 1921 with Headquarters at Trenton, New Jersey

Ordered into active military service 15 August 1942 and reorganized at Camp Butner, North Carolina

Inactivated 22 May 1946 in Germany

Activated 17 December 1946 in the Organized Reserves with Headquarters at Newark, New Jersey

(Organized Reserves redesignated 25 March 1948 as the Organized Reserve Corps; redesignated 9 July 1952 as the Army Reserve)

(Location of Headquarters changed 9 November 1955 to Kearny, New Jersey; changed 16 April 1956 to Montclair, New Jersey)

Reorganized and redesignated 1 May 1959 as the 311th Regiment, an element of the 78th Division (Training), with Headquarters at Montclair, New Jersey

(Location of Headquarters changed 1 July 1961 to Morris Township, New Jersey

Reorganized 31 January 1968 to consist of the 1st, 2d, and 3d Battalions, elements of the 78th Division (Training)

Reorganized 1 October 1993 to consist of the 1st, 2d, and 3d Battalions, elements of the 78th Division (Exercise)

Reorganized 17 October 1999 to consist of the 1st, 2d, and 3d Battalions, elements of the 78th Division (Training Support)

DISTINCTIVE UNIT INSIGNIA

COAT OF ARMS

Distinctive Unit Insignia. Description: A gold colored metal and enamel device 1 1/8 inches (2.86 cm) in height overall consisting of a shield blazoned: Azure, an oak tree Or, in a chief dancette Gules fimbriated Argent three alerions of the second. Attached below the shield a red scroll turned gold inscribed "JAMAIS TROP TARD" in gold letters.

Symbolism: The shield is blue for Infantry and blue is also the color of the shield of the coat of arms of St. Mihiel. The dancette alludes to the three rocks on the coat of arms of St. Mihiel. The oak tree represents service in the Meuse-Argonne. The arms of Lorraine are "Or, on a bend Gules three alerions of the field," and the three alerions on the red chief denote service in Lorraine.

Background: The distinctive unit insignia was originally approved for the 311th Infantry, Organized Reserves on 12 Apr 1922. It was redesignated for the 311th Regiment (BCT) on 8 Jul 1960.

Coat of Arms.

Blazon:

Shield: Azure, an oak tree Or, on a chief dancette Gules fimbriated Argent three alerions of the second.

Crest: That for the regiments and separate battalions of the Army Reserve: On a wreath of the colors (Or and Azure) the Lexington Minute Man Proper. The statue of the Minute Man, Captain John Parker (H.H. Kitson, sculptor), stands on the Common in Lexington, Massachusetts.

Motto: JAMAIS TROP TARD (Never Too Late).

Symbolism: The shield is blue for Infantry and blue is also the color of the shield of the coat of arms of St. Mihiel. The dancette alludes to the three rocks on the coat of arms of St. Mihiel. The oak tree represents service in the Meuse-Argonne. The arms of Lorraine are "Or, on a bend Gules three alerions of the field," and the three alerions on the red chief denote service in Lorraine.




